

PE and Sport Premium Grant Funding Review 2024/25

In April 2013, the Government announced funding (Sport Premium) for physical education and sport to improve the quality and breadth of PE and sport provision in schools. We must use this funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport we offer. This means that we use the premium to:

- develop or add to the PE and sport activities that we already offer.
- build capacity and capability within our school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years.

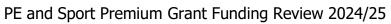
St. Joseph's school recognises the benefits of a strong Physical Education (PE) Curriculum and extra-curricular activity on developing a healthy body, improving academic performance, improved social skill and the raising of self-esteem for all pupils. At least two-hour sessions per week are dedicated to physical activity in the curriculum. The high profile of PE at St. Josephs and is reflected in the children's attendance at the extended school sports clubs as well as the achievement of the children at Local Authority competitions, festivals and the Berkshire Games.

There are 5 key indicators that we planned to see improvement across the school in 2024/2025:
